With great appreciation, I recognize MTNA's support of this unique event, which offers the rising generation of music teachers the opportunity to share their ideas and hone their craft at a national level.

In January 2012, I attended the first Piano Pedagogy Symposium at the University of Michigan. Over the past several years it has been gratifying to watch this conference grow and develop. At each Symposium, I experience a renewed sense of excitement for the future of piano pedagogy, and am invigorated by the presentations and master classes each day. 
